In order to baptize your child at St. Cassian, the family must be registered parishioners. Parents, and godparents if available, must attend a preparation class (7:00 PM) prior to the date of baptism (1:00PM). Arrangements to celebrate the Sacrament of Marriage must be made at least one year before the desired date. Do not make firm plans for the reception prior to speaking with a priest. Call the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850, to speak with a priest.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick brings the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage. It is not necessary to wait until the point of death for anointing. Contact a priest through the Parish Office, (973) 744 -2850.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is celebrated every Saturday between 4:15PM-5:00PM in the church or at another time convenient to the priest and penitent.


# Why We should Reverently Prepare for Holy Communion 

Too often there is a disconnect between what we know to be the reality of the Eucharist and the way that we participate and prepare for Mass. And if this is you, you're not alone. Father Richard Simon reflected on the Letter to Hebrews during a recent episode of Father Simon Says ${ }^{\text {M }}$, including this verse:

Therefore, we who are receiving the unshakable kingdom should have gratitude, with which we should offer worship pleasing to God in reverence and awe. For our God is a consuming fire. (Hebrews 12:28)

During his reflection, Fr. Simon confessed, "I don't prepare sufficiently for Mass. I don't. I mean, I try to, but there's always something going on. I'm always a little late."
"There are prayers that are recommended," he explained. "One should spend, Fulton Sheen said, at least 10 minutes preparing for Mass. So I confess that I don't prepare sufficiently. I intend to, but something always comes up between the rectory and the Church. It's a much longer commute than you think, because there's usually a whole string of people who want something."

Fr. Simon pointed out that as a child he actually took preparing for Mass more seriously because the customs and fasting laws were more strict. "When I received First Communion at the age of seven they had just reduced the fasting to three hours. Before that it was from midnight, and it was from food and any liquid from midnight. You could not eat or drink from midnight. That's huge. If you haven't eaten or drunk since midnight, you notice it."
"The Communion fast is now one hour before receiving Holy Communion. That means if you come to Mass and I give a long sermon, you'd almost have to bring coffee and donuts into the church to break the fast. And l'm not suggesting that you do." We don't have to offer just the bare minimum of preparation for Mass. In fact, we really shouldn't! As Fr. Simon reflected, Scripture illustrates the reality of Holy Communion, and we should prepare in whatever way is necessary to receive the Lord with reverence and awe.
"We've gone to the other extreme," he said, "but the letter to the Hebrews says we have come to something much more terrifying (terrifying!) than what happened on Mount Sinai with the thunder and the lightning and all that stuff."
"This spoke to me. I am doing it wrong. I am, in a sense, blaspheming the Eucharist. Yes. To blaspheme means to say that something is nothing. So that's gotta change in my life. And I wonder if it has to change in yours. How long do you spend preparing for Communion? Do you do more fasting than is required to prepare for Communion? Do you make sure that you're in a state of grace before you go to Holy Communion?"

## What is Adoration?

When Catholics say they are "going to Adoration," they are typically referring to Eucharistic Adoration. Which, in the most basic terms, is the worship of the Eucharist outside of the Mass. The Eucharistic Host is displayed in a monstrance on the altar so that all can see and pray in the presence of Christ.
The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us that, "Adoration is the first attitude of man acknowledging that he is a creature before his Creator. It exalts the greatness of the Lord who made us and the almighty power of the Savior who sets us free from evil. Adoration is homage of the spirit to the "King of Glory," respectful silence in the presence of the "ever greater" God. Adoration of the thrice-holy and sovereign God of love blends with humility and gives assurance to our supplications." (CCC 2628)
We can show our adoration to God in many ways, but in Eucharistic Adoration, we spend time adoring the true presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

Did You Know?

St. Vincent —Jan. 23 Patron Saint of vinegar makers, wine makers, brickmakers, and sailors

Having trained under Bishop Valerius at Saragossa, Vincent was appointed deacon of the city but was arrested in Valencia during the persecutions of Diocletian in 304. He managed to convert his jailer, but when asked to throw the Scriptures into a fire, he refused, and was then roasted on a gridiron. Before Vincent was buried in Valencia, ravens apparently guarded his body. His cult developed while Iberia was under the Visigothic control from 589-715; a basilica named after him was built on the a river in Cordoba that was later replaced by a mosque, now converted to a cathedral. Portuguese navigators in the 16th century named an island for him in the Cape Verde group.


## St. Marianne Cope- Jan. 23

Marianne Cope, TOSF, also known as Saint Marianne of Molokai (January 23, 1838 - August 9 , 1918), was a German-born American religious sister who was a member of the Sisters of St Francis of Syracuse, New York, and founding leader of its St. Joseph's Hospital in the city, among the first of 50 general hospitals in the country. Known also for her charitable works, in 1883 she relocated with six other sisters to Hawaii to care for persons suffering leprosy on the island of Molokai and aid in developing the medical infrastructure in Hawaii. Despite direct contact with the patients over many years, Cope did not contract the disease. In 2005, Marianne was beatified by the decision of Pope Benedict XVI. She was canonized (declared a saint) by the same pope on October 21, 2012.

## St Francis de Sales-Jan. 24



Having studied in Paris, de Sales became a Doctor of law at Padua, and was destined for a glittering diplomatic career. Instead, in 1593 he insisted on becoming ordained, despite his father's resistance. His first task was hazardous: to convert the Calvinists of his native Chablais country in Savoy. He largely succeeded, becoming Bishop of Geneva in 1602. He was famed for the skill, gentleness, and persuasiveness of his preaching. He was an excellent administrator and writer; his Treatise on the Love of God and the Introduction to the Devout Life ( intended for lay readers) were widely translated and remain in print today. De Sales became friendly with Jane Frances de Chantal and helped her found the Order of Visitation in 1610. His insistence that the devout life should be integrated with everyday life, and should be accessible to all, led to several congregations being established under his patronage, notably the Oblates of St. Francis de Sales and the Salesians of John Bosco.


## St. Angela Merici-Jan. 27

Angela and her sister were orphaned when young and moved to Brescia. After her sister's death, Angela entered the Tertiary Franciscan Order, and became devoted to educating poor girls in the Christian tradition. Legend tells of her journeying to the Holy Land around 1524, losing her sight in Crete on the way, but regaining it at the same place upon her return. In 1535, having selected 12 other nuns, she established a house in Brescia under the patronage of St. Ursula. The Ursulines wore lay clothing and continued Angela's work in educating girls and tending the poor. She was buried in the church of St. Afra, Brescia, which was destroyed by Allied bombing in WWII, but has now been restored at the Merician Centre.

## Conversion of St. Paul—Jan. 25



Saint Paul's entire life can be explained in terms of one experience-his meeting with Jesus on the road to Damascus. In an instant, he saw that all the zeal of his dynamic personality was being wasted, like the strength of a boxer swinging wildly. Perhaps he had never seen Jesus, who was only a few years older. But he had acquired a zealot's hatred of all Jesus stood for, as he began to harass the Church: "...entering house after house and dragging out men and women, he handed them over for imprisonment" (Acts 8:3b). Now he himself was "entered," possessed, all his energy harnessed to one goal—being a slave of Christ in the ministry of reconciliation, an instrument to help others experience the
one Savior
One sentence determined his theology: "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting" (Acts 9:5b). Jesus was mysteriously identified with people-the loving group of people Saul had been running down like criminals. Jesus, he saw, was the mysterious fulfillment of all he had been blindly pursuing.
From then on, his only work was to "present everyone perfect in Christ. For this I labor and struggle, in accord with the exercise of his power working within me" (Colossians 1:28b-29). "For our gospel did not come to you in word alone, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and [with] much conviction" (1 Thessalonians 1:5a).
Paul's life became a tireless proclaiming and living out of the message of the cross: Christians die baptismally to sin and are buried with Christ; they are dead to all that is sinful and unredeemed in the world. They are made into a new creation, already sharing Christ's victory and someday to rise from the dead like him. Through this risen Christ the Father pours out the Spirit on them, making them completely new.
So Paul's great message to the world was: You are saved entirely by God, not by anything you can do. Saving faith is the gift of total, free, personal and loving commitment to Christ, a commitment that then bears fruit in more "works" than the Law could ever contemplate.
FYI God did not change Saul' s name. Saul had two names, one Hebrew and the other Latin (Roman). Saul wanted to reach the Gentiles and needed to use his Roman name in his many travels.


## Sts. Timothy and Titus-Jan. 26

Known as companions of St. Paul, very little is known about these two bishops. They emerge as recipients of letters from Paul in the New Testament. Timothy was born at Lystra in Asia Minor, and like Paul was of Greco-Jewish parentage. He met Paul on the latter's second missionary journey, and accompanied him to its conclusion. Timothy also traveled with Paul on his third missionary journey. Thereafter Paul tasked him with encouraging Greek Christian communities in Thessalonica, Corinth, and Philippi; he is often referred to as the first bishop of Ephesus. One 4th—century account has him clubbed and stoned to death by worshippers of Artemis for objecting to one of their festivals.

Titus was a Greek, probably born at Antioch, and he traveled with Paul and Barnabas to Jerusalem to discuss with Peter whether Gentil converts to Christianity should be circumcised. He then accompanied Paul to Ephesus, and interceded in Paul's dispute with the Christians of Corinth. Paul instructed him to organize Christian communities in Crete; Titus is regarded as the first bishop of Gortyna in Crete.
