OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation, formerly RCIA) Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic? Were you baptized Catholic but never received First Communion or Confirmation? Call the parish office for details.

The **Sacrament of Baptism** is celebrated one Sunday each month except during Advent, Lent and the summer months. In order to baptize your child at St. Cassian, the family must be registered parishioners. Parents, and godparents if available, must attend a preparation class (7:00 PM) prior to the date of baptism (1:00PM). Once registered, contact the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850, to make arrangements for the date of baptism. See schedule within Scan here to download Parish Registration Form

Arrangements to celebrate the **Sacrament of Marriage** must be made at least one year before the desired date. Do not make firm plans for the reception prior to speaking with a priest. Call the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850, to speak with a priest.

The **Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick** brings the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage. It is not necessary to wait until the point of death for anointing. Contact a priest through the Parish Office, (973) 744 -2850.

The **Sacrament of Reconciliation** is celebrated every Saturday between 4:15PM-5:00PM in the church or at another time convenient to the priest and penitent.

We are truly blessed to have so many parents who always go above and beyond whatever must be done for our school.

We are very fortunate that the school has many friends.

We are very grateful to so many people: parishioners, graduates, and many friends who over the years, generously supported Saint Cassian school. May God reward them for their generosity.

So, the reason why we come here to begin Catholic Schools Week is to show our gratitude to God; to say thank you for our lives, our time together at Saint Cassian School and our faith.

We are very grateful to Mrs. Llanes, our Principal and our amazing faculty and dedicated staff who take such good care of our students and our beautiful school building.

The Proper Way to Receive Holy Communion in the Hand

The rubrics specified in the General Instruction of the Roman Missal specifically instruct the communicant to bow his head before the sacrament as a gesture of reverence. It is required for those physically able to comply.

If you are receiving the Host in your hand, extend both hands palms up toward the Priest/Eucharistic Minister, placing one hand directly on top of the other hand. If you are right handed, the right hand goes on the bottom so you can receive the Host in your left hand and then pick it up with your right hand. If you are left handed, the other way around.

The Priest/Eucharistic minister will hold the Host in front of you and say, "The Body of Christ.. The correct response is simply "Amen." No other response should be said.

The Priest/Eucharistic minister will then place the Host on your open palm. Do not attempt to grab the Host from the minister with your fingers. Once the Host has been placed in your hand, step aside (to allow the person behind you to come forward to receive) and immediately consume the Host as you stand facing toward the altar. You should pick up the Host from the palm of your hand with the fingers of your other hand and reverently place the Host in your mouth.



What do you do during Adoration?

Once you've decided to go to Eucharistic Adoration, the next common question to answer is what you should or can do while there. Catholics of all ages who attend Eucharistic Adoration for the first time feel at a loss regarding what they should be doing. Should you sit or stand? Should you kneel like the person in the seat next to you? Is it OK that one person is reading while another seems to be writing something in a notebook?

Questions like these are normal. What matters is that you have the desire and intention to attend Eucharistic Adoration to deepen your walk with Jesus Christ and experience His presence in your life in a new way. Here are a list of acceptable actions you can take so you can enter the presence of Jesus with confidence and humility and experience the blessing of the Adoration of the Eucharist.

- 1. Be there. The first step is always to show up, Leave all your fear about specifics at the door and simply approach Jesus with humility and reverence. Reflect on His work on the cross and adore Him for all He has done for you and humankind. Just sit there.
- 2. **Pray the rosary**. The Rosary offers a helpful way to spend a large chink of time in prayer while meditating on various mysteries of the Catholic faith.
- 3. Write in prayer journal. For many Catholics, memorizing prayers and knowing how to pray can seem hard. The act of writing allows your inner thoughts to come forth and help process their true feelings about a certain matter. Write down prayers that come to your mind. You can make a list of requests, blessings and situations in your life. You'll have them forever to look back on and see how God answered you.
- 4. **Pray on Your Own.** Simply bow before Jesus and pray as the Holy Spirit leads you. Talk to Jesus like you would if you were in His presence—because you are.
- 5. Listen to Music. Pick a playlist of songs that will help you focus your thoughts on God and the gift of his son Jesus. Pick a playlist of songs that will help op focus your thought on God and the gift of his son Jesus.
- **6. Read.** There are many great reading options available that can help you make the most of this sacred time, including the following:

Scripture: read the holy Word of God while meditating in Jesus' presence; **Daily devotional book**: They are great for reading a passage of Scripture and getting a concise application for your life to think about throughout the day; **Religious book**: Many high-quality religious books are out there to enrich your spiritual walk and help focus your mind on truth.

We pray a novena to praise God and trust that He will provide us with what He wants for us.

The Our Lady of Lourdes novena is a novena for healing. We ask Our Lady of Lourdes to intercede for the healing of body, mind, or spirit that we or our loved ones need.

You can participate by praying privately at a place of your choosing, in church or publicly

at the grotto.

Prayer cards with the novena prayer on the back are available on the table at the entrance to the church.

The Presentation of the Lord - Feb. 2

The Presentation, which is celebrated 40 days after Christmas, is not mentioned in the other Gospels. Only Luke tells the story, most likely because he writes for Gentile Christians who are not familiar with the Jewish rite of presentation and purification. In addition, the intent of Luke's Gospel is to show that God's promise to Israel, fulfilled in Jesus, extends to Gentiles. Source: loyolapress.com

When Christ was presented in the temple, "there was a man in Jerusalem named Simeon, and this man was just and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel" (Luke 2:25) When the Blessed Mother and Saint Joseph brought Christ to the temple, Simeon embraced the Child and prayed the Canticle of Simeon:

Now thou dost dismiss thy servant, O Lord, according to thy word in peace; because my eyes have seen thy salvation, which thou hast prepared before the face of all peoples: a light to the revelation of the Gentiles, and the glory of thy people Israel (Luke 2:29-32).

At the end of the fourth century, a woman named Etheria made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Her journal, discovered in 1887, gives an unprecedented glimpse of liturgical life there. Among the celebrations she

describes is the Epiphany, the observance of Christ's birth, and the gala procession in honor of his Presentation in the Temple 40 days later. Under the Mosaic Law, a woman was ritually "unclean" for 40 days after childbirth, when she was to present herself to the priests and offer sacrifice—her "purification." Contact with anyone who had brushed against mystery—birth or death—excluded a person from Jewish worship. This feast emphasizes Jesus' first appearance in the Temple more than Mary's purification.

The observance spread throughout the Western Church in the fifth and sixth centuries. Because the Church in the West celebrated Jesus' birth on December 25, the Presentation was moved to February 2, 40 days after Christmas.

Inspired by the words of the Canticle of Simeon ("a light to the revelation of the Gentiles"), by the 11th century, the custom had developed in the West of blessing candles on the Feast of the Presentation. The candles were then lit, and a procession took place through the darkened church while the Canticle of Simeon was sung. Because of this, the feast also became known as Candlemas. While the procession and blessing of the candles is not often performed in the United States today, Candlemas is still an important feast in many European countries.

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Blessed palms from the prior year may be returned to the rear of the Church by Feb 7th. They will be burned and used on Ash Wednesday.


Home Visits

Did You Know?





St. John Bosco—Jan. 31

Born in Castlenuovo d'Asti on August 16, 1815, John was educated in the faith and in living according to the Gospel message by his mother. On becoming a priest (1841), he chose as his life's programme: "Da mihi animas cetera tolle" ("Give me souls, take all the rest" Gen. 14: 21). He began his apostolate among poor young people with the founding of the Oratory, which he placed under the patronage of St. Francis de Sales.


He led young people to meet Christ by means of his educational style and pastoral practice, based on reason, religion and loving kindness (the Preventive System). He led young people to reflect, to meet Christ and their brothers and sisters, to the study of the faith and to apostolic, civil and professional commitment. St. Dominic Savio

stands out among the most outstanding fruits of his work.

He sought his best collaborators among his young people, thus establishing the Society of St. Francis de Sales (Salesians). Together with St. Maria Domenica Mazzarello, he founded the Institute of the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians (Salesian Sisters).

Finally, together with good and hard-working lay men and women, he created the Salesian Cooperators to work alongside him and sustain the education of young people, thus anticipating new forms of apostolate in the Church. In the centenary of his death, which took place on January 31, 1888, Pope John Paul II proclaimed him The Father and Teacher of Youth.

St. Blaise—Feb. 3 Patron Saint of Relief from Throat Ailments, English Wool Combers

We know more about the devotion to Saint Blaise by Christians around the world than we know about the saint himself. His feast is observed as a holy day in some Eastern Churches. In 1222, the Council of Oxford prohibited servile labor in England on Blaise's feast day. The Germans and Slavs hold him in special honor, and for decades many United States Catholics have sought the annual Saint Blaise blessing for their throats.

We know that Bishop Blaise was martyred in his episcopal city of Sebastea, Armenia, in 316. The legendary *Acts of St. Blaise* were written 400 years later. According to them Blaise was a good bishop, working hard to encourage the spiritual and physical health of his people. Although the Edict of Toleration (311), granting freedom of worship in the Roman Empire, was already five years old, persecution still raged in Armenia. Blaise was apparently forced to flee to the back country. There he lived as a hermit in solitude and prayer, but he made friends with the wild animals. One day a group of hunters seeking wild animals for the amphitheater stumbled upon Blaise's cave. They were first surprised and then frightened. The bishop was kneeling in prayer surrounded by patiently waiting wolves, lions and bears.

The legend has it that as the hunters hauled Blaise off to prison, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise's command the child was able to cough up the bone. Agricolaus, governor of

The "apostle of the north" (Scandinavia) became a Benedictine at Corbie, France, where he had been educated. Three years later, when the king of Denmark became a convert, Ansgar went to that country for three years of missionary work, without noticeable success. Sweden asked for Christian missionaries, and he went there, suffering capture by pirates and other hardships on the way. Fewer than two years later, he was recalled, to become abbot of New Corbie (Corvey) and bishop of Hamburg. The pope made him legate for the Scandinavian missions. Ansgar's biographers remark that he was an extraordinary preacher, a humble and ascetical priest. He was devoted to the poor and the sick, imitating the Lord in washing their feet and waiting on them at table. He died peacefully at

Bremen, Germany, without achieving his wish to be a martyr.

Sweden became pagan again after his death, and remained so until the coming of missionaries two centuries later. St. Ansgar shares the celebration of his liturgical feast with St. Blase on February 3.



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
