OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation, formerly RCIA) Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic? Were you baptized Catholic but never received First Communion or Confirmation? Call the parish office for details.

The **Sacrament of Baptism** is celebrated one Sunday each month except during Advent, Lent and the summer months. In order to baptize your child at St. Cassian, the family must be registered parishioners. Parents, and godparents if available, must attend a preparation class (7:00 PM) prior to the date of baptism (1:00PM). Once registered, contact the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850, to make arrangements for the date of baptism. See schedule within Scan here to download Parish Registration Form

Arrangements to celebrate the **Sacrament of Marriage** must be made at least one year before the desired date. Do not make firm plans for the reception prior to speaking with a priest. Call the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850, to speak with a priest.

The **Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick** brings the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage. It is not necessary to wait until the point of death for anointing. Contact a priest through the Parish Office, (973) 744 -2850.

The **Sacrament of Reconciliation** is celebrated every Saturday between 4:15PM-5:00PM in the church or at another time convenient to the priest and penitent.

2024 Lenten Regulations

The days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (Holy Saturday night) as the 'pascal fast' to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily His Resurrection. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.

On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted and two (2) smaller meals, which if added together, would not exceed the main menu in quantity. Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding on those from age 14 onwards.

The obligation to observe the laws of fast and abstinence "substantially," or as a whole, is a serious obligation.

The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial.

The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, February 18, 2024 to the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, May 26, 2024.

"Canon 920, § 1. All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year.

What is Easter Duty?

The Easter duty for Catholics is the obligation to receive holy communion during the Easter Season.

One of the minimum requirements in the Church is called by some the Easter duty, requiring Catholics to receive holy communion at least once during the Easter Season. This requirement is spelled out in the Code of Canon Law.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church adds that this Easter duty for Catholics should be preceded by confession.

The Church obliges the faithful to take part in the Divine Liturgy on Sundays and feast days and, prepared by the sacrament of Reconciliation, to receive the Eucharist at least once a year, if possible during the Easter season. But the Church strongly encourages the faithful to receive the holy Eucharist on Sundays and feast days, or more often still, even daily. CCC 1389

This requirement is meant to serve as a bare minimum for Catholics, as they are encouraged to frequent both the sacraments of holy communion and reconciliation throughout the year.

The Easter duty also emphasizes Jesus' resurrection and its connection to the gift of the Eucharist that Jesus gave the Church. Easter is the time of the year when the Church more intimately reflects on these central beliefs of the Christian faith. This is one of the many reasons why the Church urges her faithful to receive the sacraments during this holy season. Easter is the "feast of all feasts," making it an appropriate time to fulfill the Easter duty, uniting ourselves with Jesus in holy communion.



The forty-day period of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on February 14th. Ashes are a sign that we are willing to "die" to this world and live as a follower of Jesus. Ashes are also a sign of repentance. Lent is an opportunity to grow spiritually and improve

our relationship with God. As we prepare for Lent, it is helpful to take time to assess where we currently are on

our faith journey. With this insight, we can embrace Lent as an opportunity to diminish or extinguish habits or patterns of behavior that are not helping us to be the best versions of ourselves. We may also choose to try new faith practices or cultivate healthy habits.

There are three pillars of Lent: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. They work together to help us let go of what no longer serves us on our faith journeys and to embrace all that draws us closer to God.





Prayer:

Conversing with God is an opportunity to show gratitude, turn to him for comfort, and seek his wisdom. Receiving Communion is another prayer opportunity.

When we receive Communion at Mass, we are encountering Jesus Christ, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, summit of our faith. Let us center ourselves in this truth as we process to the altar and return to our pew with our hands clasped in prayer. Our love thoughts and actions matter. On the way to and from the altar, let us practice holding our hands in prayer at our hearts, and silently pray words of love for Jesus, perhaps "I love you Jesus" or "Thank you Jesus". To paraphrase Mother Theresa, let us make each Communion as it if were our first Communion, our only Communion, our last Communion.

When we receive Reconciliation and pray the Act of Contrition, we unburden ourselves and receive God's forgiveness. This Lent, Reconciliation will be offered in church on Tuesdays, March 12 & 19 from 6 to 8 pm and Saturdays at 4:15 to 5 pm.

Fasting:

Fasting increases our hunger and thirst for God. It improves our discipline and strengthens our bodies and minds. The guidelines for fasting and abstinence are listed in the bulletin.

Consider giving up common crutches, such as sweets, video-games, smartphones, soda, alcohol, junk food, social media. Practice silence to better hear God. Turn off sound (music, phones) at home or in the car, turn off the tv, eat a meal in silence, try being silent for a set amount of time each day (or an entire day).

Almsgiving:

By giving to others, we surrender our own comfort to extend that comfort to another who needs it.

Consider participating in Catholic Relief Services (CRS) "Project Rice Bowl", which directs individual parishioner fundraising efforts for the benefit of the most vulnerable of our brothers and sisters in more than 100 countries. Pick up a Project Rice Bowl kit in the entrance to the church.

Collect baby items for the Human Needs Pantry and Mercy House. Details to follow.

Register for FaithDirect and participate in the Annual Appeal.

Lent is an opportunity for us to deepen our faith as individuals and as a parish community. If each of us commits to shining our Christ light through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, imagine how brilliant the light in our own lives can become and how brilliant the parish's light will be for our local community and for the world at large.

May God continue to bless us, and strengthen us, through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving this Lenten season.

St. Valentine—Feb 14

Well, there was a priest named Valentine who lived in Rome in the third century. He was put in prison because he helped some Christians who were going to be executed by a cruel emperor named Claudius. While Valentine was in prison, he healed the chief warder's daughter, who was blind, and the warder and all his family became Christians.

When Emperor Claudius heard this, he said that Valentine should be executed. And so, on February 14 in the year 269, Valentine was clubbed to death. Then his head was chopped off, just to make sure he was dead.

In the same year, another man named Valentine, who was the bishop of Terni (about sixty miles from Rome), was also put to death by Emperor Claudius for being a Christian.

Neither saint seems to have anything to do with young lovers. So where do the traditions come from? Some say it is because on this day of the year (in the northern hemisphere) birds pair up and start mating.

Others say the day is special for lovers because at that time of year there had been a pagan Roman festival named Lupercalia, when young men took part in a kind of lottery to find a partner. But Lupercalia has nothing to do with either Saint Valentine!

Seven Founders of the Servite Order Feb 17

In the middle of the 13th century the city of Florence was torn with political strife as well as the heresy of the Cathari, who believed that physical reality was inherently evil. Morals were low and religion seemed meaningless. In 1240, seven noblemen of Florence mutually decided to withdraw from the city to a solitary place for prayer and direct service of God. Their initial difficulty was providing for their dependents, since two were still married and two were widowers. Their aim was to lead a life of penance and prayer, but they soon found themselves disturbed by constant visitors from Florence. They next withdrew to the deserted slopes of Monte Senario.

In 1244, under the direction of Saint Peter of Verona, O.P., this small group adopted a religious habit similar to the Dominican habit, choosing to live under the Rule of St. Augustine and adopting the name of the Servants of Mary. Members of the community came to the United States from Austria in 1852 and settled in New York and later in Philadelphia. The two American provinces developed from the foundation made by Father Austin Morini in 1870 in Wisconsin. Community members combined monastic life and active ministry.



Sts. Cyril and Methodius -Feb .17

The brother missionaries Cyril and Methodius are celebrated as the "Apostles to the Slavs". Born in the Greek community of Thessalonica, they learned the dialect of the Slavs at an early age and could speak it fluently.

The icon shows the two brothers joined together in their missionary effort. Cyril, the monk, wears the monastic habit together with the cross that is characteristic of the monastic life. Methodius, the Bishop wears the vestments of a hierarch with the characteristic omophorion and holds a bishop's staff. Cyril holds a scroll upon which is written the text, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations".

Cyril and Methodius composed the alphabet that is named after Cyril, The Cyrillic Alphabet, and which is used in the Slavic languages. Thus Cyril is sometimes shown holding a scroll with his alphabet. These brothers translated the Liturgy and Scriptures into the vernacular and defended its usage, thus further stressing their missionary intentions.

The entire lives of Cyril and Methodius can be summarized as a missionary response to the command of the Gospel to go forth and bring the Good News of Jesus to all mankind.

Keeping a Secret

In today's Gospel reading, a poor man with leprosy asked Jesus to heal him. Our Lord was sorry for the leper and healed him. But then He told him not to tell anyone. Do you know what the man did?

He started to tell everyone what had happened. Soon Jesus couldn't walk into towns because there were such big crowds. He had to stay out in the deserted places so that there wouldn't be mobs in the towns.

Has anyone ever told you a secret? Do you find it hard to keep secrets? Once in a while somebody might tell you something that you will need to tell your parents, but usually you shouldn't tell anyone somebody else's secret. Before you tell something to your friends, always


way you treat others is how you treat Jesus.











