In order to baptize your child at St. Cassian, the family must be registered parishioners. Parents, and godparents if available, must attend a preparation class (7:00 PM) prior to the date of baptism (1:00PM). The **Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick** brings the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage. It is not necessary to wait until the point of death for anointing. Contact a priest through the Parish Office, (973) 744 -2850.

The **Sacrament of Reconciliation** is celebrated every Saturday between 4:15PM-5:00PM in the church or at another time convenient to the priest and penitent.



What is Perpetual Adoration?



Perpetual Adoration is a Eucharistic devotion whereby members of a given parish (or other entity) unite in taking hours of adoration before the Most Blessed Sacrament (in most cases, exposed), both during the day and throughout the night, seven days a week.

A short story in the life of Saint Teresa of Avila perfectly summarizes the reasoning behind Eucharistic Adoration. One day Saint Teresa heard someone say, "If only I had lived at the time of Jesus ... If only I had seen Jesus ... If only I had talked with Jesus." She responded, "But do we not have in the Eucharist the living, true and real Jesus present before us? Why look for more?" With the availability of Perpetual Adoration, we can spend time — any time, any day — with Jesus.



Did You Know?



St. Katharine Drexel—Mar. 3rd



Born in Philadelphia in 1858, Katharine had an excellent education and traveled widely. As a rich girl, Katharine also had a grand debut into society. But when she nursed her stepmother through a three-year terminal illness, she saw that all the Drexel money could not buy safety from pain or death, and her life took a profound turn.

Katharine had always been interested in the plight of the Indians. While on a European tour, she met Pope Leo XIII and asked him to send more missionaries to Wyoming. The pope replied, "Why don't you become a missionary?" His answer shocked her into considering new possibilities.

Back home, Katharine visited the Dakotas, met the Sioux leader Red Cloud and began her systematic aid to

Indian missions.

Katharine Drexel could easily have married. But after much discussion with Bishop O'Connor, she wrote in 1889, "The feast of Saint Joseph brought me the grace to give the remainder of my life to the Indians and the Colored."

After three and a half years of training, Mother Drexel and her first band of nuns—Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and Colored—opened a boarding school in Santa Fe. A string of foundations followed. By 1942, she had a system of black Catholic schools in 13 states, plus 40 mission centers and 23 rural schools. Segregationists harassed her work, even burning a school in Pennsylvania. In all, she established 50 missions for Indians in 16 states.

Her crowning achievement was the founding of Xavier University in New Orleans, the first Catholic university in the United States for African Americans. She died at 96 and was canonized in 2000.

St. Casimir-Mar. 4

Casimir was born of kings and in line to be a king himself. As a teenager, Casimir lived a highly disciplined, even severe life, sleeping on the ground, spending a great part of the night in prayer and dedicating himself to lifelong celibacy.

When nobles in Hungary became dissatisfied with their king, they prevailed upon Casimir's father, the king of Poland, to send his son to take over the country. Casimir obeyed his father. The army he was supposed to lead was clearly outnumbered by the "enemy"; some of his troops were deserting because they were not paid. At the advice of his officers, Casimir decided to return home.

His father was irked at the failure of his plans, and confined his 15-year-old son for three months. The lad made up his mind never again to become involved in the wars of his day. He returned to prayer and study. He reigned briefly as king of Poland during his father's absence. He died of lung trouble at 25 while visiting Lithuania, of which he was also Grand Duke.



Sts. Perpetua and Felicity—Mar. 7

Perpetua was a young, beautiful, well-educated; a noblewoman of Carthage in North Africa, mother of an infant son and chronicler of the persecution of the Christians by Emperor Septimius Severus. Perpetua's mother was a Christian and her father a pagan. He continually pleaded with her to deny her faith. She refused and was imprisoned at 22.

In her diary, Perpetua describes her period of captivity. Despite threats of persecution and death,

Perpetua, Felicity—a slavewoman and expectant mother—and three companions, Revocatus, Secundulus and Saturninus, refused to renounce their Christian faith. For their unwillingness, all were sent to the public games in the amphitheater. There Perpetua and Felicity were beheaded, and the others killed by beasts. Felicity gave birth to a daughter a few days before the games commenced. Perpetua's record of her trial and imprisonment ends the day before the games. "Of what was done in the games themselves, let him write who will." The diary was finished by an eyewitness. Source:franciscanmedia.org



Did You Know?



St. John of God-Mar. 8



As a child, John worked as a shepherd, his mother died and his father having entered a monastery. As a youth he moved to Spain, joining a band of mercenaries and fighting in several campaigns for Charles V. At around age 40, he experienced a religious revelation and traveled south, determined to work among Christian slaves in Moorish North Africa, inviting martyrdom. He was deterred by a Franciscan monk, and turned to an itinerant life distributing printed religious texts and images in Andalusia. He finally settled in Granada. He heard a sermon by John of Avila (May 10), which provoked in him such an extreme fervor for religious penitence that John was committed to an insane asylum.

It would be John of Avila once again, who visited and saved him, encouraging John to care for the poor and sick, given his experience with his fellow inmates in the asylum. He went on to establish a hospital in

Granada, and formed the Hospitaller Order of St. John of God, which attracted many voluntary supporters. The order today cares for the health of the pope, while the St. John Ambulance service is named after him.



St. Frances of Rome -Mar. 9

Francesca de Roffredeschi was born to a noble family in Trastevere, Rome. Although keen to become a nun, she was married at age 13 by her parents to a soldier, who was often away campaigning. They had six children, but lost two to plague, after which Frances adopted a vow of continence, reduced her diet to bread and occasional vegetables, and helped the poor and sick.

It was the time of the Great Schism; the papacy was divided, and Rome was largely in ruins, filled with bandits. She eventually founded the Benedictine Oblates of Mary. Following her husband's death, Frances became the superior of the community. Her remains are now near her convent in the church of Santa Francesca Romana.
