St. Patrick—Mar. 17

Saint Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland, known for bringing Christianity to the country. He lived in the fifth century and was actually born in Roman Britain—not Ireland! When he was 16, he was captured by Irish raiders and was sent as a slave to present-day Northern Ireland where he became a shepherd. He grew close to his Christian faith during these difficult years and then went on and spread Christianity to the Irish through baptism and confirmation.

Hundreds of years after his death, several legends became popularized about this religious figure. One of these includes the famous story of St. Patrick driving the snakes from Ireland. But the explanation for there being no snakes in Ireland is simply that there's never been snakes in Ireland!

Across the pond, March 17 is a holy day of obligation for Irish Catholics, typically observed by attending mass in the morning. Of course, there's still room for typical St. Patrick's Day festivities—like dancing, drinking, and eating traditional Irish food—after church services conclude!

Ireland wasn't always associated with the color green. Even though its lush hills would

suggest otherwise, the Emerald Isle was actually once aligned with the color blue instead. When Henry the VIII claimed himself to be king of Ireland in the 1500s, his flag was blue, meaning that Ireland was also associated with the color. However, green was later used as the color of the flag in the Great Irish Rebellion of 1641 when the Irish fought against the English. Over the years, green became a national symbol of pride for Ireland.

Wearing green clothes became common in the U.S. at St. Patrick's Day parades and celebrations in the 1800s. It was a symbol that Irish-Americans used to honor their heritage and seems to have stuck all these years later.

Fifth Week of Lent

Easter is only two weeks away. Until the introduction of the new liturgical calendar in 1969, these final two weeks of Lent were known as Passiontide, and they commemorated the increasing revelation of Christ's divinity, as well as His movement toward Jerusalem, which He enters on Palm Sunday and where His passion will take place starting on the night of Holy Thursday.

This is the third Sunday of the scrutinies for the preparation of adult converts, and the final Sunday of Lent before the beginning of Holy Week.

National Girl Scout Sunday



Sunday March 10 was the official national Girl Scout Sunday. It is part of Girl Scout Week, which is a national effort to recognize the founding of Girl Scouts on March 12, 1912. The purpose of Girl Scout Sunday is to emphasize the importance of the Girl Scout promise and specifically to reflect upon the meaning of the word, "to serve God". Father Steve bestowed a special blessing on the Girl Scouts at the end of Mass. Pictured are Girl

Faith Formation Program attended a full-day retreat at the Vocationist

Fathers Retreat and Conference Center in Florham Park. NJ-based Fiat Ventures is our long time partner and retreat facilitator. Their "Not Too Young: Confirmation Retreat Program" is specifically tailored to meeting youth where they are on their faith journey. Activities were highly interactive, involving music, games, and lots of fun.

A theme of the retreat is that youth are not too young to make important decisions about faith and morality. The



overarching call to action is that we say "Yes!" to God's invitation to a personal relationship with him and to cultivate a personal relationship with God throughout our lives. Youth were encouraged to be authentic – to identify each of their unique God-given talents and gifts and to share those with the world. Being a disciple – embracing God and being an example to others through decisions and actions modeled on Jesus – is another goal. Attendees also learned about several saints to remind them that we are all saints in the making – ordinary people called by God to live with mission and love.


Did You Know?

Definition of Terms:

Doctor of the Church

(Latin: doctor "teacher"), also referred to as Doctor of the Universal Church (Latin: Doctor Ecclesiae Universalis), is a title given by the Catholic Church to saints recognized as having made a significant contribution to theology or doctrine through their research, study, or writing. Along with significant theological contribution, the person must also display a high degree of sanctity, which is why all church doctors are also canonized saints. A third requirement to be named a doctor of the church is formal proclamation as such by the pope or an ecumenical council. As of 2024, the Catholic Church has named 37 Doctors of the Church . Among the 37 recognized Doctors, 28 are from the West and nine from the East; four are women and thirty-three are men.

The one not identified on the cover is Hildegard of Bingen 1098, a polymath (person of wide range knowledge or learning), composer, visionary, theologian, abbess OSB, physician philosopher.

Stigmata (singular stigma) is a term used by members of the Christian faith to describe bodily marks, sores, or sensations of pain in locations corresponding to the crucifixion wounds of Jesus Christ, such as the hands, wrists, and feet.

Did You Know?





St. Joseph—Mar. 19

After the Blessed Virgin Mary, St. Joseph is the greatest of the saints. He is the one "into whose custody God entrusted his most precious treasures," Jesus and Mary. In his Apostolic Exhortation Custodian of the Redeemer, Pope St. John Paul II elaborates on this statement of Pope Leo XIII, as it touches upon Mary and Joseph's vocation with respect to the Incarnation of the Eternal Word,


[This is] the mystery in which Joseph of Nazareth "shared" like no other human being except Mary, the Mother of the Incarnate Word. He shared in it with her; he was involved in the same salvific event; he was the guardian of the same love, through the power of which the eternal Father "destined us to be his sons through Jesus Christ" (Eph 1:5).

And later, Mary is the Lord's humble servant, prepared from eternity for the task of being the Mother of God. Joseph is the one whom God chose to be the "overseer of the Lord's birth", the one who has the responsibility to look after the Son of God's "ordained" entry into the world, in accordance with divine dispositions and human laws (Custodian of the Redeemer). The Church therefore honors St. Joseph on March 19th for his faithfulness to God, and to his vocation as Custodian of the Redeemer.

The Feast of St. Joseph, or La Festa di San Giuseppe, (which happens to be Father Steve's confirmation name) is celebrated with food and drink. The holiday's roots date back to the Middle Ages, when Sicily underwent a major drought that threatened a famine. The locals prayed to their patron saint to bring them relief in the form of rain. In exchange, they promised to honor St. Joseph (the husband of the Virgin Mary) with a proper banquet. Sure enough, he answered their prayers. In return, they feasted on local foods like fava beans, which thrived after the rain, as well as many sweets. Since the feast occurs in the middle of Lent, it is a meatless celebration.

According to cookbook author and chef Lidia Bastianich, on St. Joseph's Day, Italian tables are filled with fig dishes, including fig cookies. (St. Joseph also happens to be the patron saint of pastry chefs.) Zeppole or Sfinge—dough fritters covered in sugar—are also traditionally eaten on this day. Depending on where they are consumed, they can





St. Cyril Mar. 18

Cyril's life began a few years before Arianism (the heresy that Jesus was not divine or one in being with the Father) and he lived to see its suppression and condemnation at the end of his life. In between he was the victim of many of the power struggles that took place.

We know little about Cyril's early life. Historians estimate he was born about 315 and that he was brought up in Jerusalem. He speaks about the appearance of the sites of the Nativity and Holy Sepulchre before they were "improved" by human hands as if he were a witness. All we know of his family were that his parents were probably Christians and he seemed to care for them a great deal. He exhorted


catechumens to honor parents "for however much we may repay them, yet we can never be to them what they as parents have been to us." We know he also had a sister and a nephew, Gelasius, who became a bishop and a saint.



St. Turibius of Mongroveja—Mar. 23

Spanish-born Turibius was a pious youth, devoted to prayer and service of the poor. He studied law and taught as a professor of law in Salamanca. He was chosen to be a missionary archbishop for the Spanish colony in Peru. In 1580, he was named archbishop of Lima, Peru; he then received Holy Orders and was ordained a bishop in Seville. Throughout his 25 years of missionary service, he labored to build up the local Church. He also protected the rights of the native Indian people and was responsible for creating indigenous-language catechisms. To better care for the physical and spiritual needs of the people, he introduced several European religious orders into Peru

and founded schools, churches, and hospitals. He also opened the first seminary in the New World and encouraged native Indians to become priests. As archbishop, he baptized and confirmed many into the Christian faith, including St. Rose of Lima and St. Martin de Porres. Turibius is a patron saint of indigenous rights, Latin American bishops, and Peru

Update on the Lamp March 8, 2024

Dear friends-

You have no doubt heard the news coming out of Haiti in this past week about the greatly heightened level of insecurity especially in and around the capital of Port-au-Prince.

Airports are closed, the main shipping port is closed, and the country is in a state of emergency for another month. The Haitian Prime Minister, Ariel Henry, is reported to be unable to return safely to the country as local gangs coalesce in calling for his resignation. Locally, even very basic movement around the capital is risky. Up until 2 days ago we were able to transport our staff to our second site. Yesterday and today, that has not been possible, due to dangers inherent in just driving on the streets.

Our staff is safe. Both our main Lamp for Haiti Health Center in Cite Soleil, as well as our ancillary second site, are intact. We are glad to report that news.

Today we mark the "International Day of Women". At Lamp, today especially, we stand with our sisters and our brothers in Haiti who are enduring yet another extremely difficult period. We at Lamp remain grateful for your continued friendship and involvement in this important work.

We will continue to keep you posted as best we can. In solidarity,
