OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation, formerly RCIA) Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic? Were you baptized Catholic but never received First Communion or Confirmation? Call the parish office for details.

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated one Sunday each month except during Advent, Lent and the summer months. In order to baptize your child at St. Cassian, the family must be registered parishioners. Parents, and godparents if available, must attend a preparation class (7:00 PM) prior to the date of baptism (1:00PM). Once registered, contact the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850, to make arrangements for the date of baptism. See schedule within Scan here to download Parish Registration Form


Arrangements to celebrate the Sacrament of Marriage must be made at least one year before the desired date. Do not make firm plans for the reception prior to speaking with a priest. Call the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850, to speak with a priest.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick brings the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage. It is not necessary to wait until the point of death for anointing. Contact a priest through the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is celebrated every Saturday between 4:15PM-5:00PM in the church or at another time convenient to the priest and penitent.


Divine Mercy Sunday
In a series of revelations to St. Maria Faustina Kowalska in the 1930s, our Lord called for a special feast day to be celebrated on the Sunday after Easter. Today, we know that feast as Divine Mercy Sunday, named by Pope St. John Paul II at the canonization of St. Faustina on April 30, 2000.
The Lord expressed His will with regard to this feast in His very first revelation to St. Faustina. The most comprehensive revelation can be found in her Diary entry 699.
In all, St. Faustina recorded 14 revelations from Jesus concerning His desire for this feast.
Nevertheless, Divine Mercy Sunday is NOT a feast based solely on St. Faustina's revelations. Indeed, it is not primarily about St. Faustina - nor is it altogether a new feast. The Second Sunday of Easter was already a solemnity as the Octave Day of Easter. The title "Divine Mercy Sunday" does, however, highlight the meaning of the day. Sister Faustina was a young, uneducated nun in a convent of the Congregation of Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in Poland during the 1930s. She came from a poor family that struggled during the years of World War I. She had only three years of simple education, so hers were the humblest tasks in the convent, usually in the kitchen or garden. However, she received extraordinary revelations - or messages - from our Lord Jesus. Jesus asked Sr. Faustina to record these experiences, which she compiled into notebooks. These notebooks are known today as the Diary of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, and the words contained within are God's loving message of Divine Mercy.
Though the Divine Mercy message is not new to the teachings of the Church, Sr. Faustina's Diary sparked a great movement, and a strong and significant focus on the mercy of Christ. Saint John Paul II canonized Sr. Faustina in 2000 making her the "first saint of the new millennium." Speaking of Sr. Faustina and the importance of the message contained in her Diary, the Pope called her "the great apostle of Divine Mercy in our time."
Today, we continue to rely on St. Faustina as a constant reminder of the message to trust in Jesus' endless mercy, and to live life mercifully toward others. We also turn to her in prayer and request her intercession to our merciful Savior on our behalf.
The Chaplet of Divine Mercy is said at 3 pm central time ( 4PM eastern time )on RelevantRadio.com. EWTN has several videos on Divine Mercy.
While $3: 00 \mathrm{pm}$. is the best time to pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet, the faithful can say this prayer any time of day and on any day of the week. 3 pm is the time that Our Lord died on the cross.

There is a pamphlet for the Divine Mercy Novena and Chaplet and Divine Mercy prayer cards at the rear of the church.
On Sept. 1, 2015, the Marian Fathers in Stockbridge launched a petition drive requesting the Holy See to name St. Faustina a Doctor of the Church. The Church bestows this ecclesiastical title on saints of extraordinary holiness, those whose theological writings have been declared exemplary and beneficial for the countless faithful worldwide in teaching the truth, beauty, and splendor of the faith.

#### Abstract

Haiti Update: Week of 3/27/2024 Dear Lamp Supporters, This is the third in a series of updates from Lamp for Haiti. The situation remains tense in Port-au-Prince. A partner in a major hospital in the capital wrote yesterday that each week is worse than the last. Schools and most institutions, including many banks, are closed. Everyone, including our staff, is hunkered down and hoping for relief. Lamp manager Benoit Florestal went to the office last week but said he was very nervous on the drive. Streets are empty, there are very few private vehicles on the roads, so that he felt exposed and vulnerable. Work must therefore continue from home for the time being, even though many areas have no electricity; phone and internet are very unreliable. The theme of our upcoming Spring Appeal is, however, Don't Give Up on Haiti! The country is in crisis but Lamp is poised to respond in a big way. We plan to open both of our service sites, for the first time ever, later this year. The severity of the health crisis demands our response. Predicting the exact events that could lead to this outcome is not currently possible. But Lamp has, by now, a lot of experience in responding to uncertain environments. We continue to prepare ourselves. A lot of people-our brothers and sisters- are pinning their hopes on us and we remain committed!

## Understanding

## A Walk through the Mass; A Step-by-Step Explanation The Introductory Rites

As Catholics, we know that the Holy Mass is the center of our faith and the source of divine life. Hence, the Church teaches us to participate in the Holy Mass regularly on Sundays and on Holydays of Obligation and also on weekdays, whenever possible. We Catholics know what is going to happen next. One of the basic, distinctive marks of our way of praying is ritual:
We do things over and over. When the priest says," The Lord be with you", without any thought or hesitation the congregations responds, "And with your Spirit". The priest says, "Let us pray", and the congregation stands up. Our daily lives have their rituals also: There are set ways of greeting people, eating, responding to a text. And when we are accustomed to a certain way of doing things, we seldom ask why we do it that way. In the Eucharist, too, we have many ritual actions which we perform without asking why.

## ENTRANCE PROCESSION

The procession is accompanied by a hymn or chant which is meant to foster unity in the congregation and direct our attitudes and thoughts toward the prayerful celebration of that day's Eucharist. The entrance procession symbolizes the gathering of the Body of Christ, the Church, in the presence of our Triune God in prayer.

## REVERENCING THE ALTAR

On reaching the altar, the priest and ministers make the proper reverence, that is, a low bow or a genuflection, if there is a tabernacle containing the Blessed Sacrament. As a sign of veneration, the priest kisses the altar. He does so in order to honor the altar of sacrifice which represents Christ where the miracle of the Eucharist occurs and to reverence the relics of the saints and martyrs placed within the altar itself.
The altar symbolizes the heart of the church. It is the Lord's table and the center of the Eucharistic action. It has always been considered a symbol of Christ. Now, by this kiss, the priest also signifies the union of the Spouse (Christ) with His Bride ( the Church).

## Relics of saints inside the altar

During the first centuries, the altar-table was often a stone slab place dover the tomb of a martyr. Nowadays the Church sees it fitting to maintain this practice. Relics of saints are placed beneath the altar. We have 3 relics: St. Padre Pio, St, Cassian and St. Don Bosco. Ask Fr. Steve to show them to you.

## THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

The Mass begins with the Sign of the Cross and will also end in the same way. It reminds us that we belong to Christ. We have been born through baptism to the life of grace under the sign of the cross and in the name of the Three Divine Persons.
GREETINGS
The Lord be with you. By greeting the people with the words Lord be with you", the priest reminds us that we are in the presence of God.
And with your spirit. The expression "et cum spiritu tuo" is only addressed to an ordained minister. "Spiritu" refers to the gift of the spirit he received at ordination. In their response, the people assure the priest of the same divine assistance of God's spirit and, more specifically, help for the priest to see the charismatic gifts given to him in ordination and so doing to fulfill his prophetic function in the Church.

## PENITENTIAL ACT

The Church , which is holy and at the same time a community of sinners, is conscious that her members need a continuous conversation to ask God's forgiveness and to worthily participate in the sacred mysteries so that the sacrifice may be pleasing to God.

## OPENING PRAYER

The opening prayer is the moment in which the priest invites the community to pray. It is called the "COLLECT" in Liturgical terms because the priest "collects" all the prayers of those present. This is when you silently share with God your intention for the Mass. This part concludes the Introductory Rite.

## Annunciation of the Lord-April 8

The feast of the Annunciation, now recognized as a solemnity, was first celebrated in the fourth or fifth century. Its central focus is the Incarnation: God has become one of us. From all eternity God had decided that the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity should become human. Now, as Luke 1:26-38 tells us, the decision is being realized. The God-Man embraces all humanity, indeed all creation, to bring it to God in one great act of love. Because human beings have rejected God, Jesus will accept a life of suffering and an agonizing death: "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13).
Mary has an important role to play in God's plan. From all eternity, God destined her to be the mother of Jesus and closely related to him in the creation and redemption of the world. We could say that God's decrees of creation and redemption are joined in the decree of Incarnation. Because Mary is God's instrument in the Incarnation, she has a role to play with Jesus in creation and redemption. It is a God-given role. It is God's grace from beginning to end. Mary becomes the eminent figure she is only by God's grace. She is the empty space where God could act. Everything she is she owes to the Trinity.
Mary is the virgin-mother who fulfills Isaiah 7:14 in a way that Isaiah could not have imagined. She is united with her son in carrying out the will of God (Psalm 40:8-9; Hebrews 10:7-9; Luke 1:38).
Together with Jesus, the privileged and graced Mary is the link between heaven and earth. She is the human being who best, after Jesus, exemplifies the possibilities of human existence. She received into her lowliness the infinite love of God. She shows how an ordinary human being can reflect God in the ordinary circumstances of life. She exemplifies what the Church and every member of the Church is meant to become. She is the ultimate product of the creative and redemptive power of God. She manifests what the Incarnation is meant to accomplish for all of us.

## Did You Know?



## St. Stanislaus April 11

Anyone who reads the history of Eastern Europe cannot help but chance on the name of Stanislaus, the saintly but tragic bishop of Kraków, patron of Poland. He is remembered with Saints Thomas More and Thomas Becket for vigorous opposition to the evils of an unjust government.
Born in Szczepanow near Kraków on July 26, 1030, he was ordained a priest after being educated in the cathedral schools of Gniezno, then capital of Poland, and at Paris. He was appointed preacher and archdeacon to the bishop of Kraków, where his eloquence and example brought about real conversion in many of his penitents, both clergy and laity. He became bishop of Kraków in 1072.
During an expedition against the Grand Duchy of Kiev, Stanislaus became involved in the political situation of Poland. Known for his outspokenness, he aimed his attacks at the evils of the peasantry and the king, especially the unjust wars and immoral acts of King Boleslaus II.
The king first excused himself, then made a show of penance, then relapsed into his old ways. Stanislaus continued his open opposition in spite of charges of treason and threats of death, finally excommunicating the king. Enraged, the latter ordered soldiers to kill the bishop. When they refused, the king killed Stanislaus with his own hands.
Forced to flee to Hungary, Boleslaus supposedly spent the rest of his life as a penitent in the Benedictine abbey in Osiak.

## St. Martin I, Pope and Martyr April 13



When Martin I became pope in 649, Constantinople was the capital of the Byzantine empire and the patriarch of Constantinople was the most influential Church leader in the eastern Christian world. The struggles that existed within the Church at that time were magnified by the close cooperation of emperor and patriarch.
A teaching, strongly supported in the East, held that Christ had no human will. Twice, emperors had officially favored this position: Heraclius by publishing a formula of faith, and Constans II by silencing the issue of one or two wills in Christ.
Shortly after assuming the office of the papacy-which he did without first being confirmed by the emperor-Martin held a council at the Lateran in which the imperial documents were censured, and in which the patriarch of Constantinople and two of his predecessors were condemned. In response,
Constans II first tried to turn bishops and people against the pope.
Failing in this and in an attempt to kill the pope, the emperor sent troops to Rome to seize Martin and to bring him back to Constantinople. Already in poor health, Martin offered no resistance, returned with Calliopas, the exarch of Constantinople, and was then submitted to various imprisonments, tortures, and hardships. Although condemned to death and with some of the imposed torture already carried out, Martin was saved from execution by the pleas of a repentant Paul, patriarch of Constantinople, who was himself gravely ill.
Tortures and cruel treatment having taken their toll, Martin died shortly thereafter. He is the last of the early popes to be venerated as a martyr $\underline{I}^{\text {mage: }}$ Statua di $S$.
