American Eucharistic Witnesses—Flannery O'Connor

To help pave the way to the National Eucharistic Congress July 17-23, 2024, the eucharisticrevival.org web site is presenting the *American Eucharistic Witnesses*. These are holy men and women who lived, loved, and served on the very soil upon which we now stand. They all testify—in unique and powerful ways—to what it means to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist and to mission with Him for the life of the world. Old and young, men and women, representing different cultural families and vocations, these men and women show us what holiness looks like.

There is a famous story about Flannery O'Connor defending the Eucharist that every Catholic should know, and many already do. As Flannery tells it, as a young writer she was taken by some friends to a

dinner party in the home of some famous new York intellectuals. For most of the evening, O'Connor sat in silence. She explains,: Having me there was like having a dog present who had been trained to say a few words but overcome with inadequacy had forgotten them". Late in the evening, the conversation turned to the Eucharist, and the host of the dinner party informed the others that she thought of the Eucharist as a symbol," and implied that is t was a pretty good one". At that, O'Connor said in a shaky voice, "Well, if it's a symbol, to hell with it".

Usually the story ends there. It 's a powerful line by America's greatest Catholic fiction writer, and it's a good reminder to all of us that the Eucharist is no mere symbol; it is the real Presence of Jesus Christ—Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity. But that's not the end of O'Connor's description of the event. In fact, her reflection that follows deserves our attention:" That was all the defense I was capable of but I realize now that this is all I will ever be able to say about it, outside of a story, except that it is the true center of existence for me: all the rest of life is expendable." 

A Walk through the Mass; A Step-by-Step Explanation The Liturgy of the Eucharist

The Liturgy of the Eucharist is the major part of the mass after the Liturgy of the Word. The priest, representing Christ the Lord, carries out what the Lord himself did at the Llast Supper and handed over to his disciples to be done in his memory. The Liturgy of the Eucharist consists of three sections: the Preparatory Rite, the Eucharistic prayer, and Communion Rite.

THE PREPARATORY RITE

The Preparatory Rite marks the beginning of the second major part of the Mass, the Liturgy of the Eucharist. During the Preparatory Rite, many things occur simultaneously: the collection, the offertory song, the preparation of the altar and the presentation of the gifts.

THE OFFERTORY COLLECTION

A customary collection is made where the faithful are asked to present a monetary donation for the support of the church, both local and universal. This is also an ancient custom that took the form of people giving 10% of their harvest. The money that people take from their pockets and purses can be seen as a symbol of themselves.

THE PRESENTATION OF THE GIFTS

The gifts of bread and wine are brought from the far end of the church through the assembly to indicate these are gifts from the people. Most importantly, this indicates that people are making a gift of themselves to be transformed with the bread and wine just

> as Christ gifted himself to the Father. The altar is also prepared. Sacred Vessels that are placed at the Altar are:



THE CHALICE

The chalice is a consecrated vessel that is used to hold the wine mixed with water. The chalice owes its importance mainly to what it will contain, that is, the wine turning into blood. But is also carries its own intrinsic symbolic value, since it recalls the cup Jesus used during the Last Supper.



THE PATEN

The paten is a saucer-like dish of the same material as the chalice. It must be large enough to cover the chalice. On it rests the bread to be consecrated, and later on the Sacred Host.

THE CIBORIUM

The Ciborium is a vessel that is used to hold the small hosts.

THE PURIFICATOR

It is a small piece of white linen folded in three layers and used by the priest to wipe away the excess Blood of Christ from the chalice and to purify the priest's fingers and the chalice and the paten after Holy Communion.





THE CORPORAL

It is a large square linen that is placed on the altar and upon which the sacred vessels are placed. It is used to catch all particles of Jesus Christ's body that may fall.



THE ROMAN MISSAL

It is the book containing the prescribed prayers, chants, and instructions for the celebration of Mass in the Roman Catholic Church It is placed on a missal stand.



THE RECEPTION OF THE GIFTS

After receiving the bread and wine and the offering from the people, the priest places the bread and wine on the altar.

The presider presents the bread and the wine to the Father by elevating them a little above the altar with prayers to accompany these gestures. Both prayers begin, "Blessed are you, Lord, God of all creation", a brief prayer of praise taken from the Jewish tradition. Both the prayer for the bread and the wine look forward to the transformation of these gifts into the body and blood of Christ.

PREPARATION OF THE CHALICE

During the preparation of the Chalice, a little water is added to the wine. The wine and the water represent two realities in the Eucharist. The water represents Jesus' humanity and the wine His divinity. Therefore, when water is mixed with the wine in the chalice, the whole of humanity, that means all of us, the people are made one with Christ, the Divine. The priest say quietly: "By the mystery of this water and wine, may we come to share in the divinity of Christ, who humbles himself to share in our humanity." When the gifts have been prepared, the priest says quietly: "With humble spirit and contrite heart may we be accepted by you, Oh Lord, and may our sacrifice in your sight this day be pleasing to you, Lord God".

RITE OF WASHING OF HANDS

The Rite of Hand Washing is a symbolic gesture of purification. The priest says: "Wash me, Oh Lord, from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin". It is an important moment because it manifests that when the priest celebrates the Mass, he is praying, not just repeating mechanical gestures, but rather he is speaking with God.

The preparation of the offering concludes with two prayers. First, after the Washing of the Hands, the priest invites everyone participating in the liturgy to join their voices to the prayer he has just said in silence—that the offering may be acceptable to God. The priest says: "Pray, brethren, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the almighty Father". The phrase "and Yours" refers to our personal sacrifices and intentions that we unite with the one sacrifice of Christ.

This very short invitation and response from the people has a very profound meaning and speaks volumes of what is being celebrated, the Mass.

The Mass is a sacrificial offering of the one-time sacrifice that Christ offered to the Father on the Cross for us. The Mass makes present again Christ's perfect self-sacrifice on the Cross. Bread and wine are sacrificed at Jesus' instruction since He said that these elements would become His Body and Blood sacrifice on Good Friday.

The Mass is the sacrifice of the priest since through his ordination he acts in the person of Christ, Head of the Church. The power given to him at his ordination makes the celebration of the Mass possible. Through this power, Christ's sacrifice is made present and the bread and wine become the real Body and Blood of Christ.

Jesus in the person of the priest then present our sacrifices and intentions to God the Father, who looks on us with Favor because we have united ourselves to His Son.

THE PREFACE

Now, the great event of the Mass is about to take place: the miracle of the transubstantiation. The Eucharistic prayer begins with a preface. In the preface, we give thanks to God, we recognize His acts of love and we praise Him. The liturgy guides us to elevate our heart to be ready for the most important moment: when Christ makes Himself present with His Body and Blood. The preface is introduced by the Great Dialogue between the priest and the people. The celebrant invites us to Lift up our hearts. When he speaks it is really the Lord Jesus who speaks to us.

THE SANCTUS

The Preface ends with this song of praise to God: The Sanctus. The first part is the song that the angels continuously sing in heaven without ceasing beside the throne of God as the prophet Isaiah heard it. The second part is the acclamation of the crowd on Palm Sunday: "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord, Hosanna in the highest".

We have reached the heart of the Eucharistic Prayer, the Consecration which is the most important moment of the Mass.



Haiti Update: Week of 4/11/2024

This is the fifth in a series of updates from Lamp for Haiti on the current crisis in Haiti and how it is affecting Lamp and the people we serve.

Here's hoping that the crisis will be over soon, but the pace of change is not fast. We will update you every two weeks, going forward!

I had a lengthy conversation with Lamp manager Benoit Florestal yesterday on the situation in Port-au-Prince and prospects for the future. The following update reflects his opinion on these things:

Benoit had just arrived at the Lamp office/dept. He reported that roads seemed safer; the increased number of vehicles showing that gang activity has lessened.

Most businesses, however, remain closed. Banks have greatly reduced the number of days that they are open each week. There is a \$200 limit on withdrawal of US dollars. Schools have not, in fact, opened, despite the fact that the Ministry of Education issued a schedule of final exams last week. (Schools are open in most of the country outside of Port-au-Prince). Benoit tells me, though, that some schools have opened but have told their students to dress in casual clothes since their uniforms might attract too much attention(!) The airports (local and international), the ports, and the land border with the Dominican Republic remain closed, and this has led to shortages of every type, including fuel. Many businesses simply do not have any products to sell. Electricity is available for an hour or so per day. People that previously invested in solar power systems, such as Benoit (and Lamp), are in a much better place than their fellow citizens.

On the political side there is predictable in-fighting as all political actors in the country struggle to have their representatives included in the transitional government. Meanwhile, various gangs have formed a coalition call Viv Ansanm (Live Together) and are threatening a coup, under recently returned leader Guy Philippe.

For the Lamp, concern centers around activities related to the international airport, since our depot and both service sites are close to the airport. Police—acting as a virtually independent agency—are making a concerted effort to increase security around the airport. Part of that effort, unfortunately, includes the destruction of makeshift homes all around the airport perimeter. Nevertheless, for Lamp, the importance of the airport means that our sites are in an area in which order will be imposed as a priority. Benoit suggests that the airport may be reopened soon and this would greatly assist in the normalization of activity in this part of the city.

Lamp has a large quantity of medical supplies, purchased before the recent crisis, and can resume full services at any point.

I know that not everyone is interested in the details of the situation in Haiti. Our next update will be focused more on the Lamp itself. One thing is certain, however: Lamp is accumulating unmatched local knowledge which has allowed us, and will allow us, to provide critically needed services with effectiveness and discernment in this challenging environment.

Take care everyone.

Did You Know?





St. George - April 23

Countless stories are told about St. George, including the famous episode of the dragon and the girl saved by the saint. According to the standard version of the legend, we hear that in the city of Selem in Libya, there was a large pond where a terrible dragon lived. To appease it, the inhabitants offered him two sheep a day and later a sheep and a child drawn by lot. One day the king's daughter was chosen, and while she was heading toward the pond, George passed by and pierced the dragon with his spear; a gesture that became a symbol of faith triumphing over evil.

George, whose name in Greek means "farmer," was born to a Christian family in Cappadocia around the year 280. After moving to Palestine, he joined the army of Diocletian. When the emperor issued the edict of persecution against Christians in

303, George gave all his belongings to the poor and, in front of Diocletian himself, tore the document apart and professed his faith in Christ. For this he suffered terrible torture and was eventually beheaded.

Shortly after his death, a basilica was erected over the place of his burial in Lydda (modern-day Lod, in Israel). His relics are still visible today. St George is considered the patron of knights, soldiers, scouts, fencers and archers, among others; he is also invoked against the plague and leprosy, and against venomous snakes. As in the case of other saints wrapped in legend, the story of St George serves to remind the world of a fundamental idea, that good ultimately triumphs over evil.



St. Fidelis of Sigmaringen—April 24

If a poor man needed some clothing, Fidelis would often give the man the clothes right off his back. Complete generosity to others characterized this saint's life.

Born in 1577, Mark Rey became a lawyer who constantly upheld the causes of the poor and oppressed people. Nicknamed "the poor man's lawyer," Rey soon grew disgusted with the corruption and injustice he saw among his colleagues. He left his law career to become a priest, joining his brother George as a member of the Capuchin Order. Fidelis was his religious name. His wealth was divided between needy seminarians and the poor.

As a follower of Saint Francis of Assisi, Fidelis continued his devotion to the weak and needy. During a severe epidemic in a city where he was guardian of a friary, Fidelis cared for and cured many sick soldiers.

He was appointed head of a group of Capuchins sent to preach against the Calvinists and Zwinglians in Switzerland. Almost certain violence threatened. Those who observed the mission felt that success was more attributable to the prayer of Fidelis during the night than to his sermons and instructions.

He was accused of opposing the peasants' national aspirations for independence from Austria. While he was preaching at Seewis, to which he had gone against the advice of his friends, a gun was fired at him, but he escaped unharmed. A Protestant offered to shelter Fidelis, but he declined, saying his life was in God's hands. On the road back, he was set upon by a group of armed men and killed. Fidelis was canonized in 1746. Fifteen years later he was recognized as a martyr.



St. Mark, the Apostle and Evangelist —April 25

Mark was born in Jerusalem, and was raised by his mother, Mary, in a house where (according to Acts 12:12) the first Apostles would meet. He is often identified as the young man who briefly accompanied Christ after His arrest in the Garden of Gethsemane, narrowly escaping arrest himself by slipping out of his clothes and running foe safety (Mark 14:51). He is sometimes referred to as John Mark, After their visit to Jerusalem, he traveled with Paul and

Barnabas (who was Mark's cousin) back to Antioch; Barnabas and Mark then both accompanied Paul on his first missionary journey, although Mark accompanied Paul on his first missionary journey, although mark decided to return to Jerusalem when they reached Perga (Pamphylia) in Anatolia. This caused something of a rift with the senior Apostle, although Barnabas and Mark later wend on to evangelize Cyprus under Pauls' guidance.

At a later date, mark appears to be in Rome with both Paul and Peter. It is with Peter that Mark became most closely associated, seemingly acting as his secretary and as an "interpreter" of Peter's ideas. This experience primed Mark well for his most important achievement—the compilation of the second Gospel.




