OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation, formerly RCIA) Are you or someone you know interested in becoming Catholic? Were you baptized Catholic but never received First Communion or Confirmation? Call the parish office for details.

The **Sacrament of Baptism** is celebrated one Sunday each month except during Advent, Lent and the summer months. In order to baptize your child at St. Cassian, the family must be registered parishioners. Parents, and godparents if available, must attend a preparation class (7:00 PM) prior to the date of baptism (1:00PM). Once registered, contact the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850, to make arrangements for the date of baptism. See schedule within Scan here to download Parish Registration Form

Arrangements to celebrate the **Sacrament of Marriage** must be made at least one year before the desired date. Do not make firm plans for the reception prior to speaking with a priest. Call the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850, to speak with a priest.

The **Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick** brings the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage. It is not necessary to wait until the point of death for anointing. Contact a priest through the Parish Office, (973) 744-2850.

The **Sacrament of Reconciliation** is celebrated every Saturday between 4:15PM-5:00PM in the church or at another time convenient to the priest and penitent.

God Bless Our First Holy Communion Candidates!



Father Steve introduced a beautiful vision of hosting intimate Communion Masses in which the children are actively involved. In support of this vision, St. Cassian is holding six Communion Masses this Spring, on April 20th and 21st, April 27th and 28th, and May 4th and 5th.

Children, families, teachers and staff worked together throughout the year to prepare for the Sacrament. All children successfully completed a series of faith formation classes. They received the Sacrament of Reconciliation in January 2024. Along with their families, the children created a Communion banner for display in Larkin Hall. New this year, the children were asked to play individual and group roles in the Communion Mass. This required them to learn a statement of gratitude to their parents, the readings of the day, a renewal of their baptismal vows, the universal prayers, and a closing prayer. Children also brought up flowers to the Blessed Mother and a series of gifts to the altar, including a Bible, bread and grapes, chalice, and the wine and host.

On the Friday prior to their Communion Masses, the candidates attend a full-day rehearsal in the church and Larkin Hall. The rehearsal includes practicing their various roles and learning their songs with cantor Chris Janish. In addition, the children enjoy snacks and lunch together, along with a few games and activities. The children each planted marigold seeds in a small pot to take home, along with a note to their parents, thanking them for their support and helping their faith to grow.

Communion candidates also received a lot of love from the parish on their faith journey. Gifts of a rosary, scapular, and prayer book were blessed at the 9:30 AM Mass on April 14th and given to each child prior to their Sacrament. In addition, the Communion and Confirmation candidates partnered with one another on their spiritual journey. The 8th graders prayed for and made each 2nd grader an ornament with the child's name on it.

Please enjoy the photos of the candidates who rehearsed on 4/19 and received their Sacrament on 4/20 & 4/21. We appreciate your continued prayers for these candidates as well as for the candidates who will soon receive their Sacrament.

It is such a gift to support the young people of the parish as they receive Jesus in the Eucharist for the first time.

May God continue to bless the children and families of St. Cassian parish!

The Eucharistic Prayer

We have reached the heart of the Eucharistic Prayer, the Consecration which is the most important moment of the Mass. Kneeling is the humblest way of worshipping God during Mass. When we kneel, we completely submit and surrender ourselves to our Heavenly Father. That is why, during this part of the Mass, no one should stand-up nor walk as this is the most solemn moment that we show reverence to Jesus who is physically present at the altar.

THE INSTITUTION NARRATVE

During the Institution Narrative, the priest extends his hands over the bread and wine and calls upon the Holy Spirit to change them into the Body and Blood of Christ. He then recalls the events of the Last Supper, the institution of the Eucharist.

The priest, acting in the person of Christ, says the words of the institution of the Eucharist: "TAKE THIS, ALL OF YOU, AND EAT OF IT, FOR THIS IS MY BODY, WHICH WILL BE GIVEN UP FOR YOU". "TAKE THIS, ALL OF YOU, AND DRINK FROM IT, FOR THIS IS THE CHALICE OF MY BLOOD, THE BLOOD OF THE NEW AND ETERNAL COVENANT, WHICH WILL BE POURED OUT FOR YOU AND FOR MANY FOR THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS. DO THIS IN MEMORY OF ME. "

These words have the power to transform reality. The offerings of bread and wine cease to be such and are truly converted into the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus. This is the very moment when Christ becomes physically present at the altar and in our midst.

THE RINGING OF THE BELLS

An altar server often rings a small bell or bells during the Consecration to draw attention to the precise moment when transubstantiation—the conversion of the bread and wine into the body and blood of Christ—takes place.

The first ringing may take place prior to the Consecration, as a sign that this important moment in the Mass is about to take place. Typically, this pre-consecratory bell is rung when the Holy Spirit is called upon to sanctify the bread and wine just before the celebrant begins the institution narrative, in which Jesus' words at the Last Supper are recounted.

The bell is rung again during this most climactic point of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass to draw the faithful's attention to the elevations of the Consecrated Host and Precious Blood, and thus look upon and adore their Eucharistic Lord.

ACCLAMATION

At this point, the priest invites us to make an acclamation, a response to the Mystery of Faith now present in the Body and Blood of Christ. We speak directly to the Lord himself now present at the altar in His Real Body and Blood. The rest of the Eucharistic Prayer is a prayer for unity and intercessions.

THE DOXOLOGY

A "doxology" is a short Trinitarian hymn of praise to God.

We respond with the great "AMEN". This makes the Eucharistic Prayer our own and complete the great Trinitarian Doxology by all of us saying "Amen". This ends our Eucharistic Prayer.





We would like to invite you to become a part of the LIVING ROSARY. What is necessary is a commitment to say <u>one decade</u> of the Rosary each day. You then become a member of a team who together says the entire rosary each day. The decade can be prayed any time. American Eucharistic Witnesses: The Venerable Fulton Sheen and the Most Holy Eucharist

Fulton J. Sheen was born on May 8, 1895 in El Paso, Illinois. His family moved to Peoria when he was young. They were parishioners at the Cathedral of St. Mary where Fulton was an altar server and student in the cathedral school.

Fulton received his First Holy Communion at the age of twelve. When he was old enough, he went to seminary to study to become a priest. He was ordained in 1919. On the day of his ordination, Fulton made the commitment to pray a Holy Hour of Adoration every day before the Blessed Sacrament. He kept that promise for his whole life! Fulton's time with Jesus in the Most Holy Eucharist helped him to love God and love all

people. He offered Mass, received Jesus in Holy Communion and adored Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. Jesus was the source of Fulton Sheen's holiness.

Fulton began writing articles and books about our Catholic Faith. He was invited to speak on the radio and host his own television show. Using both wisdom and humor, Fulton Sheen helped thousands of people learn about Jesus. In 1951 he was consecrated a Bishop.

An argument can be made that the most well-known and recognized Catholic priest in the United States in the middle of the last century was the Venerable Bishop Fulton J. Sheen. For 20 years as "Father Sheen", later Monsignor, he hosted the night-time radio program *The Catholic Hour* on NBC (1930–1950) before he moved to television and presented *Life Is Worth Living* (1952–1957). Sheen's final presenting role was on the syndicated *The Fulton Sheen Program* (1961–1968) with a format that was very similar to that of the earlier *Life Is Worth Living* show. For that work, Sheen twice won an Emmy Award for Most Outstanding Television Personality, and was featured on the cover of *Time* magazine. Starting in 2009, his shows were being re-broadcast on the EWTN and the Trinity Broadcasting Network's Church Channel cable networks. His contribution to televised preaching resulted in Sheen often being called one of the first televangelists.

His television series, *Life is Worth Living*, reached an estimated viewing audience of 30 million people each week. (For those old enough to remember, the show was opposite Milton Berle's show *Uncle Miltie*. As a Catholic grade student, we were told to tune into the Bishop Sheen show and not the *Uncle Miltie* show).

Fulton met Pope Saint John Paul II when he came to visit St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York. The Pope said to Fulton, "You have written and spoken well of the Lord Jesus. You are a loyal son of the Church!" Fulton Sheen died two months later on December 9, 1979. He was declared Venerable in 2012. We have a picture of Bishop Fulton Sheen in our stained glass windows. Can you find it?

Did You Know?





St. Catherine of Siena, Doctor of the Church—April 29

Caterina di Jacopo di Benincasa known as Catherine of Siena was an Italian mystic and pious laywoman who engaged in Papal and Italian politics through extensive letter-writing and advocacy. Canonized in 1461, she is revered as a saint and as a Doctor of the Church due to her extensive theological authorship. She is also considered to have influenced Italian literature. Catherine was allegedly the 24th of 25 children of a wealthy Siense dyer, and decided not to marry, vowing chastity after having a vision of Christ when she was only seven. She became a Dominican tertiary at around 20. After experiencing a mystic marriage with Christ she received the stigmata, and began to preach repentance. Preaching proved to be her forte. Her influence with Pope Gregory XI played a role in his 1376 decision to leave Avignon for Rome. The Pope then sent Catherine to negotiate peace with


the Florentine Republic. After Gregory XI's death (March 1378) and the conclusion of peace (July 1378), she returned to Siena. The Great Schism of the West led Catherine of Siena to go to Rome with the pope. She sent numerous letters to princes and cardinals to promote obedience to Pope Urban VI and to defend what she calls the "Vessel of the Church". She died on 29 April 1380, exhausted by her rigorous fasting. Catherine was declared the first female Doctor of the Church in 1970.



St. Pius V- April 30

Pope Pius V, OP was born Antonio Ghislieri in 1504 and was called Michele Ghislieri. He was head of the Catholic Church and ruler of the Papal States from 7 January 1566 to his death, in May 1572. He is venerated as a saint of the Catholic Church. He is chiefly notable for his role in the Council of Trent, the Counter-Reformation, and the standardization of the Roman Rite within the Latin Church, known as Tridentine Mass. Pius V declared Thomas Aquinas a Doctor of the Church. By means of the papal bull of 1570, Regnans in Excelsis, Pius V excommunicated Elizabeth I of England for heresy and persecution of English Catholics during her reign. He also arranged the formation of the Holy League, an alliance of Catholic states to combat the advancement of the Ottoman Empire in Eastern Europe. Although outnumbered, the Holy League famously defeated the Ottomans at the Battle of

Lepanto in 1571. Pius V attributed the victory to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and instituted the feast of Our Lady of Victory. Biographers report that as the Battle of Lepanto ended, Pius rose and went over to a window, where he stood gazing toward the East. "..looking at the sky, he cried out, 'A truce to business; our great task at present is to thank God for the victory which He has just given the Christian army'."



St. Joseph -the Worker -May 1

St. Joseph's main feast day is March 19. This second feast was introduced by Pope Pius XII in 1955. It was allocated to May 1, widely celebrated as Labor Day or May Day, in direct response to the challenge of atheistic Communism.

"Saint Joseph is a man of great spirit. He is great in faith, not because he speaks his own words, but above all because he listens to the words of the Living God. He listens in silence. And his heart ceaselessly perseveres in the readiness to accept the Truth contained in the word of the Living God," Pope John Paul II had once said.


Joseph is the patron of many things, including the universal Church, fathers, the dying and social justice.

Did You Know?





St. Athanasius—May 2

Saint Athanasius the Great, Archbishop of Alexandria, was a great Father of the Church and a pillar of Orthodoxy. He was born around the year 297 in the city of Alexandria into a family of pious Christians. He received a fine secular education, but he acquired more knowledge by diligent study of the Holy Scripture. It was as a deacon that Saint Athanasius accompanied Patriarch Alexander to the First Ecumenical Council at Nicea in the year 325. At the Council, Saint Athanasius refuted the heresy of Arius, proposed the structure for the currently canonized books of the Bible, and wrote the Nicene Creed.

After the death of holy Patriarch Alexander, Saint Athanasius was unanimously chosen as his successor in the See of Alexandria. There was a time when he remained as the only Orthodox bishop in the area, a moment when all the other bishops had fallen into heresy. He wrote countless letters and tracts against the Arian heresy.

Numerous works of Saint Athanasius have been preserved.



St. Philip and St. James—May 3

Philip and James were both apostles, and both served Christ faithfully during the very early days of the Church.

Philip seems to have been an enthusiastic person. He was the one who brought his friend Nathanael to Jesus, insisting to Nathanael that he had found the person about whom Moses had written. Some years later it was Philip who made arrangements, with the help of Andrew, to have a group of Greek Gentiles brought to Jesus. Philip the apostle is not to be confused with the deacon Philip of Acts 8, who preached in Samaria and baptized the Ethiopian, although some writers say that they are the same person. Philip also had a practical, down-to-earth mind. He was the apostle who commented that it would take a considerable amount of money to feed a crowd of more than 5,000 hungry men,

women, and children. It was Philip who asked to see the Father when Jesus spoke about him at the Last Supper.

James was the son of Alphaeus and seems to have been born in Caesarea. He is mentioned less frequently in the New Testament than Philip is. Sometimes James is called the Less, which might be a hint that he was a short person or else that he was younger than the other apostle named James.

After Jesus' death James continued to preach the Gospel and is believed to have become the first bishop of Jerusalem. Assuming that James and the first bishop of Jerusalem are one and the same person, then he met his death as a martyr in that city about the year a.d. 62. Tradition identifies James as the author of the epistle associated with his name.


